Black Elderberry <i>Sambucus canadensis</i>	Deciduous suckering shrub , fruit edible to humans. MH-12, MS-12, GR, LP-LF, SM-SWD, AP, FFW
NINEBARK <i>Physocarpus opulifolius</i>	Deciduous shrub, insect & disease resistance, adaptable to wide range of site conditions, suitable for erosion control. Fall interest. MH-3-10, MS-4-6, GR, LP-LF, SM- SWD, AP, FFW
Summersweet <i>Clethra alnifolia</i>	Popular in woodland gardens because it attracts birds and butterflies. MH-5-10, MS-5, LS-LF, SM, GM, AP
Paw Paw <i>Asimina triloba</i>	Patch-forming (clonal) understory tree found in well-drained, deep, fertile bottomland & hilly upland habitat. MH-25, MS-15. LS in youth, LP-LF in maturity, SWD, GM, AP, FFW
PERSIMMON <i>Diospyros virginiana</i>	Very adaptable with exception of wet areas. Edible fruit for humans and wildlife, fine-grained wood is valued. May form colonies/groves. MH-50, MS-30, LF, SWD, AP, FFW
Redbud <i>Cercis Canadensis</i>	Small tree popular in urban settings, lovely rosy pink blooms in April. MH-30, MS-35, GM, LP-LF, SWD, AP, FFW
AMERICAN PLUM <i>Prunus americana</i>	Member of Rose family w/ white, aromatic blossoms leading to sweet fruit edible for humans & wildlife, preferring field/forest edges. MH-20, MS-25, GR, LF, SM-SWD, AP, FFW
Black Walnut <i>Juglans nigra</i>	Home to many species w/ fruit edible for humans. Can be toxic to a number of trees/plants if planted too close. MH-70, MS-20, LP-LF, SM-SWD GR, FFW
Common Lilac <i>Syringa vulgaris</i>	Aromatic Spring bloom. Classic choice around the home. MH-20, MS-10, LP-LF, SM-SWD, GM, AP
Ohio Buckeye <i>Aesculus glabra</i>	State Tree. Primarily found in understory. MH-60, MS-30, LS-LP, SM GM, FFW
Paper Birch <i>Betula papyrifera</i>	Desirable ornamental, browsed by white-tailed deer; birds & small mammals eat the buds, catkins & seeds. MH-70, MS-25, LF, SM-WD, GR, FFW
Serviceberry-Downy <i>Amelanchier arborea</i>	Tall shrub/small tree bearing clusters of fragrant white flowers in April, giving rise to flavorful, red to purple-black, berrylike fruit MH-40, MS-30, LP, SM-WD, GR, AP, FFW
Shagbark Hickory <i>Carya ovata</i>	Found in wetter areas & dry uplands. Distinctive shaggy bark. Striking winter appearance. MH-100, MS-40, LP-LF, SM-SWD, GS-GM, FFW
Sugar Maple <i>Acer saccharum</i>	Valued for shade & hard, dense, fine-grained and difficult-to-split wood. Confined spaces or areas where salt is a problem. Acidic soils. MH 80, MS-40, LP-LF, SM-SWD, GS
SHUMARD OAK <i>Quercus shumardii</i>	Found in western part of Ohio along ravines, upper floodplains/streams. Tolerates dry soils, shade tolerant in youth, thrives in full sun. MH-60, MS-40, LF, SWD, GR, FFW
Tulip Poplar <i>Liriodendron tulipifera</i> L.	Desirable street, shade, or ornamental tree but the large size it attains makes it unsuited for many sites. MH-80-120, MS-30, LF, SM-WD GR, AP
White Oak <i>Quercus alba</i>	Habitats ranges from dry forests/fields to woodlands/slopes. Supports wildlife species in abundance. MH-70, MS-70, LF, SWD GS-GM, FFW
Bald Cypress <i>Taxodium distichum</i> Illinois	(Deciduous Conifer) Related to Giant Redwoods. Tolerant species found near wetlands. MH-60, MS-25, LP-LF, SM, GR
ARBORVITAE <i>Thuja</i>	Evergreen with Scale-like leaves, consumed by deer & other mammals & birds in winter & providing shelter. Often surrounds ponds, perimeters. MH-30, MS-10, LF, SWD, GR, FFW
Norway Spruce <i>Picea abies</i>	Popular windbreaks. Adaptable to harsh conditions. Prefers acidic soils. MH-80, MS-40, GM-GR, LP-LF, SM-SWD, FFW
White Pine <i>Pinus Strobus</i>	Popular evergreen provides food & shelter for numerous forest birds. MH-80, MS-40, LF, SWD, GR, FFW
Bee Balm <i>Monarda didyma</i>	Petite delight Lavender-rose flowers. Mid-late summer blooms attract butterflies and hummingbirds. MS, MH,MS-1-2ft, AP
Butterfly Weed <i>Asclepias tuberosa</i>	Larval food plant of queen & monarch butterflies. Blooms orange early summer-late autumn, favors sand or gravel soil; seen on stream margins/rain gardens. MH-1-2, MS-1-2, LF, AP
CONEFLOWER Cheyenne Spirit <i>Echinacea spp.</i>	Mixed color -White, cream, red, pink, orange, yellow or purple flowers with brown disk flowers. LF-LP, SWD, AP
GAY FEATHER Kobold <i>liatra spicata</i>	Deep purple flower grows well in moist gardens, prairies & sedge meadows w/ tall spikes resembling feather, blooming July-August/September. MH-1-2, MS-1-2, LF, SWD, AP
LAVENDER Sweet Romance <i>Lavandula angustifolia</i>	May become shrublike, strongly aromatic perennial, long lasting early summer blooms blue-purple, foliage grey green. MH, MS-1-1.5, LF, SWD, AP
Purple Love Grass <i>Eragrostis spectabilis</i>	Grows low to the ground in dense tufts, Blooms red, purple Aug-Oct. Late summer, appears like reddish-purple clouds @ ground level. MH-1 1/2, MS-3, SWD, LF, AP
TICKSEED Red Satin <i>Coreopsis</i>	Herbaceous perennial, wine-red bloom from June-August. If thinned out may bloom again in Fall. Clumps may be divided in Spring. MH-1-1.5, MS-1.5-2, SWD, LF, AP
TURTLEHEAD Hot Lips <i>Chelone lyonii</i>	Herbaceous perennial with Spikes of pink snapdragon-like flowers, prefers very moist soils, thriving in poorly drained soils. Spreads Slowly by rhizomes; divide every 2-3 years. MH, MS-2, SM, LS, AP
